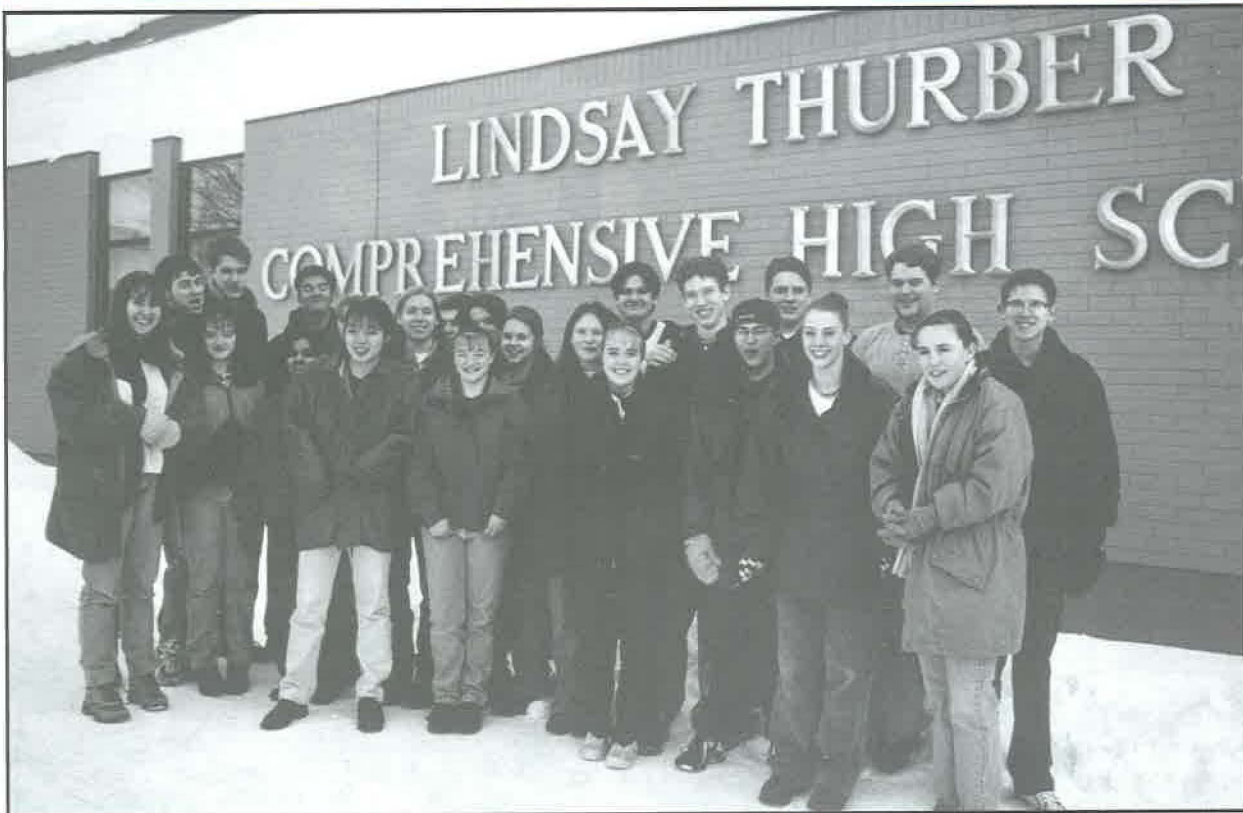

RED DEER PUBLIC'S 5TH IMMERSION CLASS GRADUATES:

Red Deer Public School Board's 5th French Immersion class will graduate from École Lindsay Thurber Comprehensive High School in June 1997. French Immersion was first introduced in 1981 with only 15 students.

Chris Rozell and Jennifer Corrales are two grade 12 students who will be graduating with a bilingual certificate in June of 1997. Today there are nearly 600 students in French Immersion programmes in four schools in the Red Deer Public School District.

Bilingual diploma worth the effort

For Chris Rozell, earning his bilingual certificate was worth the effort.

"I wanted something to show for the extra effort that I have put into my education. It was an extra challenge."

"Being fluent in another language is great. A big bonus has to be that when I hosted a student from France I could understand everything he said....now I can't wait to go on the school trip to France."

When faced with the question of continuing in French Immersion after grade 8 Rozell decided to stick with the programme in high school as he enjoyed immersion and the sense of camaraderie in the class.

The grade 12 student is glad he stuck with it, saying that knowing French will be an asset for travel and the world of work.



Jennifer Corrales and Chris Rozell have been French Immersion classmates for 13 years.

Jennifer Corrales has been a classmate of Chris' for 13 years. Her mom enrolled her in French Immersion because she felt a second language would be useful to her in the future. A trip to Quebec in Grade 8 confirmed Corrales' commitment to the programme.

"I started to realize the French went beyond what I was learning in French class."

Jennifer also believes that being bilingual broadens your knowledge of the world.

"If there is a good book and I have heard about it I can read it regardless if it is in English or French....the same with T.V."

Both Chris and Jennifer agree with parents who don't speak French it was more difficult for them to help you. They got very good at translating for their parents.

Jennifer believes that she studied harder because the courses were in French. "You have to work harder.....French Immersion is definitely worth it, but the challenge isn't for everyone."

Bilingual certificate offered

Grade 12 students who have completed 48 credits in French will be eligible for a bilingual certificate. In addition, Lindsay Thurber is one of the few schools that allows students to combine French Immersion with the International Baccalaureate (I.B.) Programme. Students enrolled in both programmes will require 43 credits in French for the certificate.

Beyond High School

"Knowing French will facilitate travel and enhance work opportunities. Other languages will also be relatively easy to learn....like Spanish", said Jennifer

Chris added, "being bilingual can only improve your credentials...having been in Immersion can be an asset to you and your employer....being able to speak another language increases the number of places that you can work in the world."

Why did you choose to enrol your children in Immersion?

We put our first child in French Immersion because we thought being bilingual would help him increase the possibilities for work as an adult. KINDERGARTEN

Acting is a big part of a French Immersion kindergarten teacher's job. We rely heavily on props to communicate with our students, said a group of kindergarten teachers. In September, the kids have absolutely no idea what we are talking about.

That means if we want the class to cut a paper in half we have scissors on hand to demonstrate.

Encouraging words, a fun approach to teaching and acting skills do the trick.

It's a step by step process

The first few weeks of the year are spent explaining the ground rules for Kindergarten. The students learn to be responsible for themselves; how to be part of a group and how to work in a classroom.

The Kindergarten teachers do much of this initiation in English.

From mid-September until December, is the teachers' biggest job - teaching the students basic French vocabulary - colours, shapes, numbers - the building blocks of the Kindergarten program.

As the school year goes on, it gets easier. The students start to understand one by one and help each other. After Christmas we usually start show and tell giving the students a chance to use the French words they have learned.

Happy kids key to success in French Immersion

The key to success is making sure the students are comfortable at school.

They may be saying... "I don't understand what the teacher says", but the most important thing is the social relationships they develop. The students learn to work well together. They support one another in learning a new language. Having fun while learning plays a big part too. We use little songs with little words and make it like a guessing game. It's really important to keep it fun and light at the beginning of the year.

Encouragement is important too.

We tell them they are doing a good job, in English, because they need to feel they are competent in their daily work and they are a little nervous about being in French Immersion.

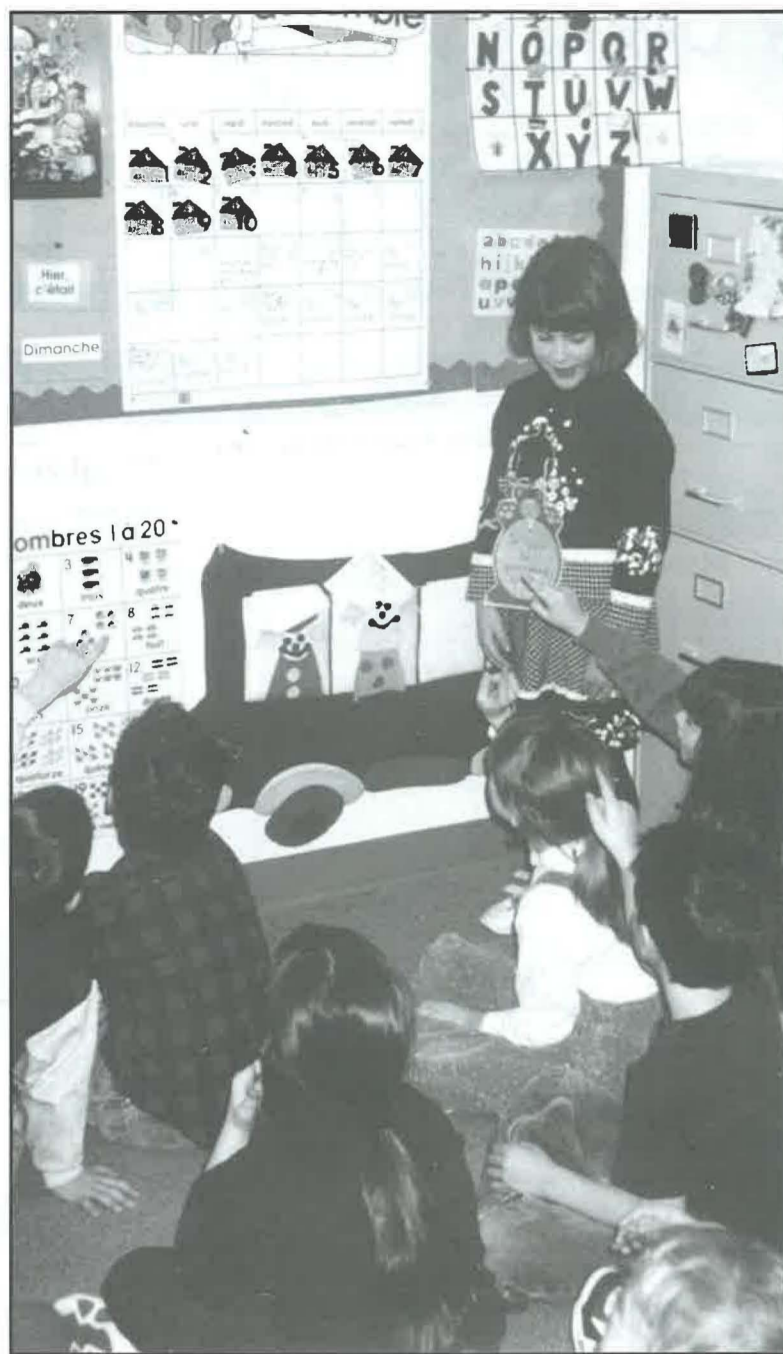
Listening skills and confidence blossom

As well as important grounding in language acquisition, the group of teachers agree that their students leave Kindergarten with excellent listening skills.

They can't be half listening and catch it. They have to be completely there. When you give directions they have to be focussed on what you are saying.

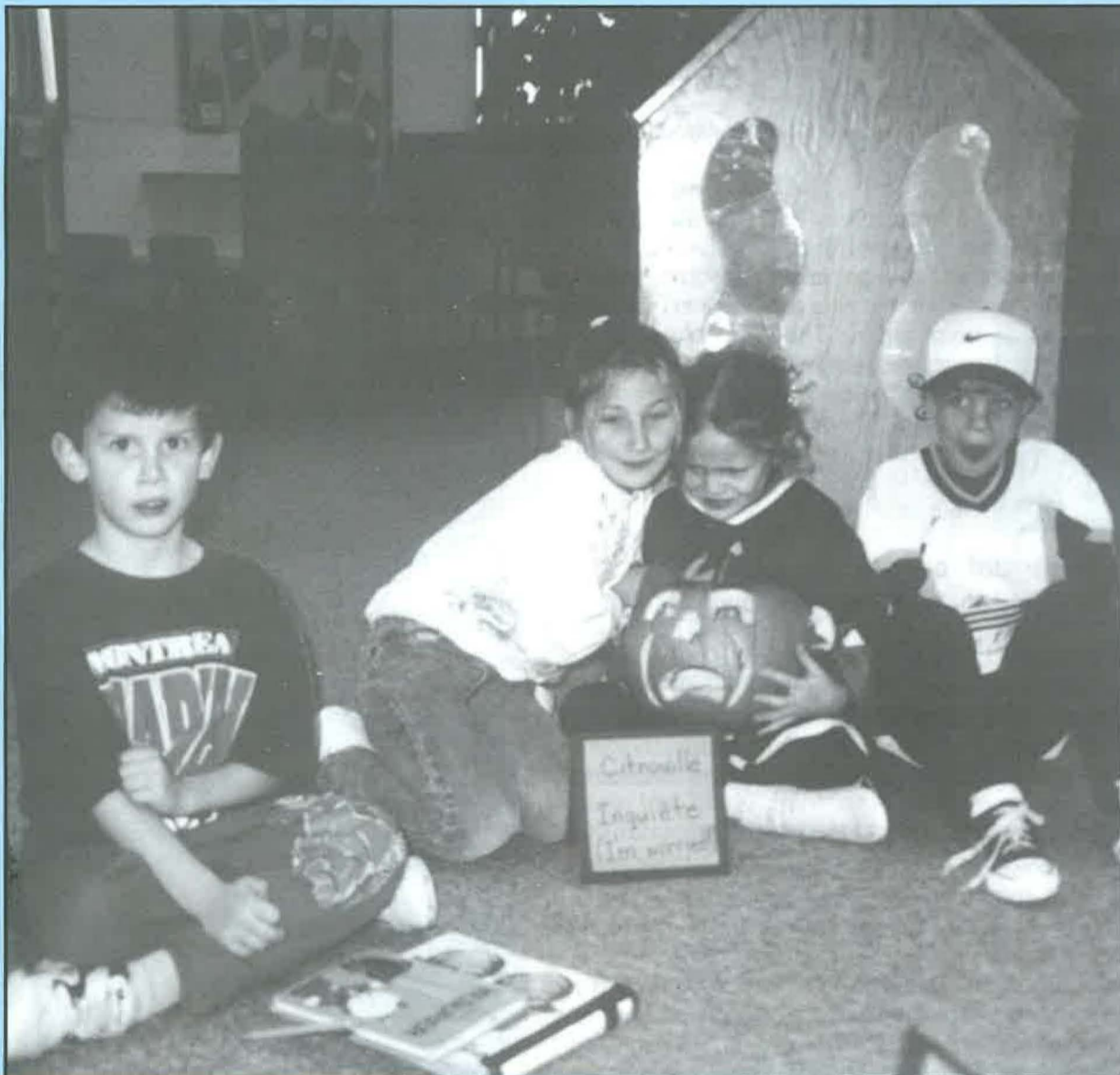
Their self-confidence also blossoms.

"I think they start out thinking - 'I don't have a clue what the teacher is talking about' and by the end they are able to joke in the language. It gives them the feeling that 'Hey I can do this'.

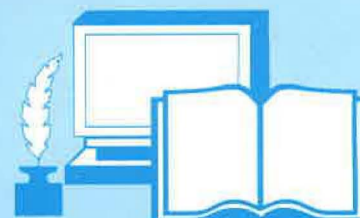

GRADE ONE

Making her students comfortable in a French environment is a Grade 1 French Immersion teacher's first job. We focus on language and routine. We try to get them to understand the basic things and get them confident in the language...so they are able to work in it.

Students start off not speaking French

When the students enter Grade 1 they speak little French. But by Christmas, the students are talking quite a bit of French and after Spring Break, students are asked to communicate in French only.

Hearing the language first step

The first step in this process is to attune the students' ears to the language. Like a baby, he or she needs to hear a lot of the language before they can try to speak. They have to have a feel for it.

Body language, visual clues and choosing their words carefully are all part of a grade one teacher's strategies.

The students become very good listeners as they look for every possible clue to understand what is happening.

Immersion teachers use themes and look at subjects from all angles to help students develop vocabulary. Books, movies and speakers are all things that help to immerse the kids in the language as well as the subject material.

As confidence grows, students try out French

When they talk in French, we really encourage them. They have more self-confidence - they are more likely to try things.

French Immersion students work at the usual Grade 1 curriculum, reading and writing, except they do so in French. Progress is a little slower as they learn these skills in a second language.... But once they start, they progress quickly.

MIDDLE SCHOOL

École Intermédiaire Central Middle School is the school which is responsible for immersion at the grades 6, 7, and 8 levels. Ours is a dual track school, which means that there are both English and French programs available. There are approximately 550 students in the school, and over a third are in the Immersion programme. There are two streams of Immersion at Middle School. The first is early, or continuing immersion, for students who have been in the program in elementary school. There are two classes at each grade level of early French Immersion. The second is late French Immersion for students who are beginning in grade 6. This is to allow late entry for students who are deciding to meet the challenge after the first five years of schooling. The two streams are merged in grade nine at Lindsay Thurber.

Late Immersion

"Basically a student considering late French Immersion needs to be a strong motivated student willing to put in an effort to learn a second language", said John Johnston, Vice principal of École Central Middle School. "We spend the first three months of grade 6 developing a good language base as well as study and organizational skills in order to give the kids a good foundation for their studies in French", added Johnston.

Challenge of French Immersion prepares students for rigours of the work world

Grade 11 student, Jason Wyman toyed with the idea of entering an English program for high school, but after considering the advantages of earning a bilingual certificate, Jason registered in LTCHS French Immersion program.

He feels the challenge of learning in a second language has better prepared him for the rigours of high school and the working world.

WHAT MAKES DISTRICT PROGRAM DIFFERENT?

Dual-track French Immersion program offered in schools.

Red Deer Public Schools offer French Immersion in dual-track schools, which means French Immersion and English students are housed in the same building.

"This approach promotes tolerance and understanding among our students and provides opportunities for interaction between the English and French programs to the benefit of all our students," said high school French Immersion Team Leader, Rob Porkka.

There has been a lot of success with this approach especially at the high school level. Students are able to continue their language studies and enjoy all the options and opportunities that a large established high school has to offer.

Students may continue in French Immersion and specialized programs such as International Baccalaureate (I.B.) and Music.

Formal English instruction introduced in Grade 3

Red Deer Public Schools French Immersion schools focus on French instruction in Kindergarten through Grade 2. This is done in order to give our students a solid grounding in their second language.

In Kindergarten and through Grade 2, an environment is created that encourages students to use their new language. Once our students have a solid grounding in their second language, formal English instruction is introduced in the beginning of Grade 3.

Students do well in English as they use their French language skills to springboard their English language skills!

FRENCH IMMERSION Q & A

Here are some commonly asked questions about French Immersion:

Who can register in French Immersion program?

The French Immersion program is open to all children. It is designed for children whose first language is not French.

Is the French Immersion program viewed as being a successful program?

Yes. The French Immersion model is the most researched model of second language acquisition in the world. Canada's model is used in the United States and abroad.

What effect does learning a second language have on the cognitive development of the child?

Research indicates that children who learn more than one language gain in cognitive development. Through learning a second language, children come to see the world from a second perspective, demonstrating divergent thought process development.

Why is total immersion so important in the early grades?

Children in French Immersion live in a primarily English environment. Their French Immersion classroom is in most likelihood the only place where they will have an opportunity to develop their French language skills. In the interest of giving French Immersion students a good grounding in their second language, it is best to focus exclusively on developing their French language skills in the early grades.

Why continue immersion at the High School?

High school gives students the opportunity to use, perfect, and improve both written and oral French. Brain research shows the more students are exposed to a second language at a young age the more likely they will retain the skill in later life... like any skill you must use it!

Will students in French Immersion loose their English?

Absolutely not. Beyond their classroom, French Immersion students are surrounded by English - at home, and through the media. Students in French Immersion simply acquire a second language in addition to their mother tongue. In Red Deer Public Schools, formal English Language Arts is not introduced until Grade 3 and students' English and content subject skills are at par with or above their counterparts in English language programs by the beginning of Middle school.
