

New Directions:

WPE Learning Loss was led by the Learning Assistance teacher and implemented by two specifically trained Educational Assistants. Based on Alberta Education assessments, growth was observed in all students participating.

Phonemic awareness and phonics skills were enhanced through the implementation of UFLI with kindergarten to grade 3 students. All staff involved found it to be beneficial to student growth.

Opportunities and Challenges:

An initiative was implemented to support student regulation and was supported by an Educational assistant. A designated space was identified and included tools to support regulation. The challenge became our Education assistant time was consumed by a one-to-one style support for several learners. This process left little time for academic support in the inclusive classroom.

A Year of Success:

Red Deer Public Schools continues to provide high quality learning opportunities for our students. Anecdotal Results, Analysis and Action

Anecdotal Results:

• Literacy and Numeracy survey results have stayed consistent. The percentage of students reading within one year of grade level is increasing throughout their time at WPE.

Analysis:

• Our Grade 1 and 2 students are coming in with a lower level of readiness for reading, which results in lower reading levels. More students are reading at grade level by the time they leave elementary school.

Action:

- We have implemented grade level designated literacy and numeracy time so support for regrouping is more fluid.
- Use Alberta Education literacy and numeracy interventions, UFLI, guided reading, and LLI as targeted support for students at risk.
- We are providing opportunities for staff to collaborate on literacy and numeracy intervention strategies.

Equity

Outcomes

- All staff have the ability to meet the diverse needs of all students through excellent instruction.
- Students are supported in their academic, behavioural, social and emotional well-being.

Action:

 We are continuing to develop a common language and will move beyond it to a common practice in supporting all students in our school. Our Student Support Room is the foundation of this philosophical shift in helping dysregulated students in the inclusive school setting.

- Children have an excellent start to their learning journey in Pre-K and Kindergarten.

Anecdotal Results, Analysis and Action

Anecdotal Results:

Consistent level of satisfaction with our Character Education programming.

Analysis:

• Kindergarten students who are chronic nonattenders are struggling academically and socially making it difficult for these students to achieve academic readiness for grade one as well as engage as members of the school community. These gaps in learning, as well as their ability to function in their school community leading into grade 1, cause the students to struggle.

Action:

- Kindergarten students are part of our Character Education programming, along with our grades 1-8 students.
- We have a school-wide focus on monitoring attendance. Students with attendance concern are being tracked and supported.

Success for First Nations, Métis and Inuit students

Outcome

FNMI Students are engaged in learning.

Anecdotal Results, Analysis and Action

- Our FNMI planting and harvesting was used as a tool to support both learning and cultural needs of our community, as
 the dried herbs can be used by families.
- We plan to increase the indigenous presence and understanding in our school by examining the Truth and Reconciliation commission - Calls to Action and determine the need for further growth within the WPE community. We will do a tour of some other schools to determine the most meaningful ways to begin some of this work.
- We would like to complete a Reconciliation project at WPE this year.
